PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Greetings in Jesus' name!

Let me begin with a story from Sadhu Sundar Singh (1889-1929?), an Indian missionary sent to reach the people in Northern India.

"While sitting on the bank of a river one day, I picked up a solid round stone from the water and broke it open. It was perfectly dry in spite of the fact that it had been immersed in the water for centuries. The same is true of many people in the Western world. For centuries they have been surrounded by Christianity; they live immersed in the waters of its benefits. And yet it has not penetrated their hearts; they do not love it. The fault is not in Christianity, but in men's hearts, which have been hardened by materialism and intellectualism."

Recently, I was much impacted by this phrase, "the pursuit of the heart". Anything that catches your heart, catches you! Jesus reinforces this truth, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." Matthew 6:20. Simply put, your heart is always tied to things or people you love.

A few thoughts as I relate that to our BWJ readings:

- 1. We must allow our hearts to be pursued by the Holy Spirit with His truth. Failing to do so is like the round stone though immersed in water for centuries, it is wet only on the outside, but caked utterly dry inside!
- 2. We must allow the Word to penetrate us and we must be willing to grapple with it. What is the Word saying about me? How am I to respond in this situation based on the Word? The Word convicts, reveals and tests us even as it speaks unto us (Hebrew 4:12), calling us to respond in humility and obedience.

- 3. Four powerful questions you can ask to allow the Holy Spirit to pursue your heart.
 - a) What are my thoughts?
 - b) How do I feel about it?
 - c) What are my deepest desire?
 - d) What choices do I need to make?
- 4. Respond to the Lord in prayer and supplication, asking Him for His grace and power to obey.

As we continue to read BWJ together, share your stories to encourage one another on how the Word has impacted and transformed you.

INTRODUCTION TO THE READINGS

This quarter, we cover the gospel of Mark, and then move on to 1 Samuel. Both these books are full of 'action', without much of a pause at any point. Christ's ministry from baptism to crucifixion to resurrection includes healings and other miracles, authoritative teachings, hard-hitting parables, conflicts with the teachers of the law and between the disciples, and most of all a singular Good News for all who believe. As we read about Jesus repeatedly trying to tell the disciples what was about to happen to Him, may we be reminded not to take for granted what seems familiar and well-known. And as we pick up where we left off at the beginning of 2023 (when we read from Joshua, Judges, and Ruth), we will be reading about prophets, kings, and the ascension of God's chosen people as a unified and increasingly powerful nation. And just as disobedience, sinfulness, and unfaithfulness remain evident in Israel, God's faithfulness, grace, and justice are even more evident. May we remember Him today!

The provided questions for each day's readings are intended to prompt reflection while providing some historical or scriptural context for better understanding. The pronouns "I", "me", and "my" are liberally used to reflect the personal nature of these reflections. We encourage those who are able to read Scripture communally (either in families or other gatherings of disciples) to substitute "we" and "our" pronouns where appropriate. The noun "faith communities" is used to represent the communal gathering of people of faith, otherwise traditionally referred to as the church. As always, Scripture reigns supreme, and none of the material provided here claims to that level of authority which belongs only to Him who is the Word made flesh.

May the Good News overflow in our lives and testimonies.

1 OCT, TUESDAY

John the Baptist Prepares the Way

Mark 1:1-11

Context Julius Caeser was 'deified' in 42 BC, and his adopted son 1) Ouestions Augustus Caeser called himself Divi filius (meaning 'son of god'). What is the significance of Mark's usage of this to ponder term in Mark 1:1, written to an audience under the rule of Rome? 2) Malachi 3:1 and Isaiah 40:3 both refer to God's messenger. How did John the Baptist fulfil these (and other) prophecies? 3) John preached a baptism of repentance, but pointed to a greater coming baptism of the Spirit. How does repentance prepare me for the One who baptises with the Holy Spirit? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

2 OCT, WEDNESDAY

Jesus Begins His Public Ministry

Mark 1:12–20

Context 1) The temptation of Christ precedes His public ministry, Ouestions and immediately follows the Father's public acknowledgement of His Son. How is Christ's temptation to ponder relevant to me in my own times of temptation (Hebrews 2:18)? 2) Who are those whom Christ first calls? Is their occupation, education, or place in the social structure of 1st century Israel relevant to me today? 3) What is the commonality between the responses of Simon and Andrew and those of James and John? Is my own obedience to Jesus similar to theirs? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

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3 OCT, THURSDAY

Authority and Purpose

Mark 1:21–39

Context	
Questions to ponder	 What locations did Jesus go to in today's passage, and for what purpose? Was healing His initial plan? How much sleep did Jesus get that night? What does this tell me about His motivations and priorities? What can I learn from the contrast between the disciples' words in Mark 1:37 and Jesus' words in Mark 1:38?
Head What can I understand?	
Heart How do I respond?	
Hands What must I do?	

4 OCT, FRIDAY

Healing and Forgiveness

Context What faith did the man with leprosy have? What doubt 1) Ouestions did he have? How did Jesus respond to the man's doubt? 2) Both healings in today's passage (as well as the healings to ponder in yesterday's passage) were the result of someone approaching Jesus. Do I need to approach Him today for healing (either for myself or for those I love)? Theologically, the forgiveness of sin is 'harder' than 3) physical healing. Is it easier to 'say' that sins are forgiven, or that a physical ailment is healed? What proof was Jesus giving to the teachers of the law? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

5 OCT, SATURDAY

Why Sinners?

Context 1) Jewish tax collectors were rich, almost certainly corrupt, Ouestions and definitely greedy - making their wealth by extracting heavy taxes backed by unjust imperial state power. Who to ponder would be friends with a tax collector (according to Mark 2:15)? 2) Levi was still a tax collector when Jesus said "follow me". What was his immediate response? Why did he respond in that way? The actions and reactions of Jesus and the Pharisees are 3) in stark contrast. How does my faith community view fellowship with sinners? Are there certain sinners that I would avoid associating with due to social stigma? What Head did Jesus do? What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

6 OCT, SUNDAY

Sunday Worship Celebration

SCRIPTURE PASSAGE

PREACHER

7 OCT, MONDAY

Why Law?

Context The Jews had built up traditions for observing the Law 1) Questions strictly - including additional days of fasting and codification of permitted and non-permitted Sabbath to ponder actions. Over time, obeying these traditions took on similar importance to obeying God's Law, because those observances elevated God's Law! What was Jesus' response to this? 2) Today's passage is sometimes seen as promoting a kind of 'originalism' - only God's actual Law should be taken as Law. Other times it is seen in terms of 1 Corinthians 10:23 (which says 'all things are lawful'). What is the purpose of the Law, according to Jesus? Head Evangelical Christians today reject most of the traditions 3) What can I of the 'older' denominations. Has my faith community understand? replaced these traditions with informally-codified traditions of our own? What would Jesus have to say about our worship, discipleship practice, and training up of the young (or young in the faith)? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

8 OCT, TUESDAY

Jesus the Celebrity

Mark 3:7–19

Context	
Questions to ponder	 Jesus began his ministry (see Oct 2 and 3 reading) by proclaiming the good news and by teaching. What, instead, was it that drew crowds from around the region to Him? How did Jesus respond to being 'mobbed' by the crowds? How have modern day prominent believers and leaders handled similar circumstances? What was the purpose of the twelve according to Mark
Head What can I understand?	3:14–15? How does that purpose compare to Jesus' own purpose that we read about last week? What can I learn here about discipleship?

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9 OCT, WEDNESDAY

Crazy Talk

Context Jesus' celebrity was so disruptive that his family staged 1) Ouestions an intervention. How does John 7:5 help me to understand Jesus' family's reaction? to ponder 2) The teachers of the law came to see Jesus (Mark 3:22), yet were convinced His healings were a trick. Why did they believe that, and how did Jesus' response expose their ulterior motives? Jewish culture valued familial piety highly (as our own 3) Asian cultures do) - how is Jesus' response in Mark 3:33-35 an affront to those values? Why would Jesus connect the doing of God's will with familial relationships? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

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10 OCT, THURSDAY

The Parable of the Sower

Context	
Questions to ponder	 So far the book of Mark has only mentioned Jesus' teaching in passing, today's passage is the first narration of one of Jesus' teaching stories (also called parables). Why did Jesus speak in parables according to today's passage? Was His purpose to exclude? The parable of the sower is one of the more famous parables. A big reason for that is that Jesus' explanation of the parable was recorded in Mark 4:14–20. What is the main lesson of this parable?
Head What can I understand?	 3) The gospel writers make it clear that most parables (including today's parable) were primarily 'aimed' at Jesus' disciples. Based on Mark 3:14–15, what character in this parable would Jesus have expected His disciples to model? What does this mean to me as a disciple of Jesus?

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11 OCT, FRIDAY

Kingdom Parables

Context 1) Today's passage collects teaching regarding the Ouestions inexorable nature of the Kingdom of God. The first section both teaches and warns those who hear Jesus' to ponder teachings. What lesson does Jesus have for me from Mark 4:21-25? 2) The two 'seed' parables continue the analogies introduced in yesterday's passage. What do these parables say about the Kingdom of God? 3) Mark 4:33 provides more context to Jesus' use of parables. How does this verse help me understand Jesus' repeated refrain that 'if anyone has ears, let him hear' (for e.g. Mark 4:23)? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

12 OCT, SATURDAY

Jesus' Power Over the Storm

Mark 4:35–41

Context 1) In today's passage, what is the danger that Jesus and His Questions disciples are facing? How to the disciples react to this danger (recall that some of them were experienced to ponder fishermen)? What is Jesus' approach to this danger? 2) 3) Jesus demonstrated divine power - how did the disciples react? What is my own response to Christ's power over His creation? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

13 OCT, SUNDAY

Sunday Worship Celebration

SCRIPTURE PASSAGE

14 OCT, MONDAY

Jesus' Power Over the Legion

Mark 5:1–20

Context 1) In today's passage, what is the challenge that Jesus and Questions His disciples are facing? How would the disciples have reacted to the demon-possessed man? to ponder 2) What is Jesus' approach to this challenge? Jesus demonstrated divine power - how did the 3) townspeople and the demon-possessed man react? What is my own response to spiritual warfare? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

15 OCT, TUESDAY

Jesus' Power over Sickness and Death

Mark 5:21–43

Context 1) In today's passage, what heart-felt pleas are brought to Questions Jesus? When have I fallen at Jesus' feet over the health or demise of a loved one? to ponder What is Jesus' response to Jairus and the woman who 2) had bled for twelve years? 3) Jesus demonstrated divine power - how did the individuals and families affected react? What is my own response to divine healing? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

16 OCT, WEDNESDAY

Different Soils

Context 1) Today's passage reads well together with the parable of Ouestions the sower (Mark 4:1-8). Why did Jesus' own hometown turn out to be poor quality 'soil'? to ponder 2) The twelve apostles were sent without provision. How were they received in the towns they passed through? 3) The contrast between Jesus in Mark 6:5–6 and the twelve apostles in Mark 6:12-13 is stark. What similarities did the twelve apostles have with Jesus' on work of ministry? What caused the differences? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

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17 OCT, THURSDAY

John the Baptist Beheaded

Mark 6:14-29

Context 1) Today's passage is primarily a flashback to the Ouestions circumstances surrounding John's arrest and eventual beheading. What does Scripture say regarding the reason to ponder for John's arrest? 2) King Herod (perhaps in guilt) hears about Jesus and connects Him with the recently executed John. What other parallels can be seen in this account of the end of John's life and Jesus' own future crucifixion? 3) King Herod hears about Jesus because 'His name had become well known' – presumably because of the work of the twelve apostles in yesterday's passage. Whose name is glorified in my own work and service to God? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

18 OCT, FRIDAY

Mark 6:30–44

The Feeding of the Five Thousand

Context This incident is the only incident (other than the 1) Ouestions resurrection) which is described in all four gospels. Why do Jesus and the twelve withdraw to a solitary place (see to ponder also Matthew 14:13)? 2) There is some irony in Jesus and the twelve going from 'not even having a chance to eat' (Mark 6:31) to 'giving them something to eat' (Mark 6:37). What prompts Jesus' patience with and provision for the large crowd (Mark 6:34)? 3) God's provision in today's passage seems to have overflowed. What significance is there to the number of basketfuls of food left over? Who would this food have Head been meant for? What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

19 OCT, SATURDAY

Jesus Walks on Water

Mark 6:45–56

Context 1) Why does Jesus send his disciples ahead? What is His Questions priority? Mark says 'they had not understood about the loaves' 2) to ponder regarding the apostles. What had they not understood? Are Jesus' words in Mark 6:50 relevant to me today? 3) Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

20 OCT, SUNDAY

Sunday Worship Celebration

SCRIPTURE PASSAGE

PREACHER

21 OCT, MONDAY

Holding to Human Traditions

Mark 7:1–23

Context	
Questions to ponder	 Today's passage revisits Jewish codifications of the Law (see reading on Oct 7). What is the specific criticism raised by the Pharisees and teachers of the law? Jesus denounces the legalistic traditions of the Pharisees, demonstrates that some of them nullify God's Law, and finally establishes a 'new' standard for defilement. Does this 'new' standard contradict the law of God as given in the Torah (first five books of the Old Testament)?
Head What can I understand?	 3) Is today's passage only applicable to the consumption of food? Do I and my faith community see defilement arising from other more modern external factors (such as style of clothing, body art, jewelry, and various forms of facial/bodily surgery)? What principle does Jesus give here?

<i>Hands</i> What must I do?	

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22 OCT, TUESDAY

Two Different Healings

Context	
Questions to ponder	 Mark (and Jesus) make clear that the woman in Tyre was not a Jew, yet she had both heard of Jesus and discovered where He was staying. Did this matter to Jesus (see also Matthew 15:24)? Should this matter to me? The deaf and mute man is implied (by omission) to be Jewish. How are he and the people who bring him treated differently from the Greek woman? How are they treated the same?
Head What can I understand?	 3) In both of today's healings, Jesus 'did not want anyone to know'. It is likely, given the context of the book of Mark so far, that He sought quiet places to teach rather than public recognition. Why then did Jesus not turn away the Greek woman and the deaf and mute man?

23 OCT, WEDNESDAY

Do You Still Not Understand?

Context	
Questions to ponder	 Faced with a very similar challenge as that described in Mark 6:30–44, the disciples respond with the question of Mark 8:4. Did this indicate a practical spirit, a lack of faith, or something else? In the midst of numerous miracles, the Pharisees ask for a sign. What sign would have convinced them? What does Jesus' response teach me about dealing with unbelief, especially from outside my faith community?
Head What can I understand?	3) In Mark 8:14–21, Jesus wants to teach, but the disciples cannot hear or understand Him. What is foremost on their minds? What is foremost on my mind when Jesus speaks to me? Do I need an increased faith in God's provision today?
<i>Heart</i> How do I respond?	
Hands What must I do?	

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24 OCT, THURSDAY

Don't Tell Anyone

Mark 8:22–30

Context	
Questions to ponder	 Yet again, someone in need of healing is brought to Jesus. Why does Jesus bring the man outside the village, and then tell him not to go into the village? While travelling, Peter declares explicitly the identity of Jesus Christ, over the assumptions of the crowds who repeatedly approached Him. What is Jesus' response to the disciples? Why does Jesus repeatedly command His disciples and those He healed not to tell anyone? Does this command extend to me, 2 millennia later (see also Mark 9:9)?

Hands What must I do?	

25 OCT, FRIDAY

Which Messiah?

Context	
Questions to ponder	 What did Peter and the twelve expect from the Messiah? How did Jesus' teaching in Mark 8:31 confound their expectation, leading to Peter's rebuke? Jesus then teaches the crowd and His disciples about the cost of discipleship. The cross was well known even before Christ's crucifixion, one of Rome's chief instruments of execution for rebels. What was Jesus calling His disciples to? Isaiah 52:13–53:12 describes the suffering servant, yet
Head What can I understand?	the disciples had difficulty understanding and accepting Jesus' teaching on this. How do I understand the necessity of Christ's suffering today, with the benefit of knowing 'the rest of the story'?

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26 OCT, SATURDAY

The Transfiguration

Context 1) Why was it Elijah and Moses who appeared on the mount Ouestions of transfiguration (refer to the reading of Aug 5 from Malachi 4:4-6)? What did these men represent? to ponder 2) What purpose did the transfiguration serve for Peter, James, and John? What was God trying to show to them? 3) Some parts of Scripture are firmly grounded and meant to be understood in the context of their time and history. Mark 9:7 is different, with divine instruction which is just as relevant today as it was two thousand years ago. How am I listening to Christ today? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

27 OCT, SUNDAY

Sunday Worship Celebration

SCRIPTURE PASSAGE

PREACHER

28 OCT, MONDAY

Overcoming Unbelief

Context 1) What was the topic of the arguments between the Ouestions teachers of the law and the disciples? Were these arguments fruitful? to ponder 2) Jesus repeatedly mentions unbelief in today's passage. Can I conclude that the reason the boy was possessed was due to unbelief, either his own or that of his father or relative? The desperate father's cry in Mark 9:24 is familiar to us 3) today. We believe, yet we do not. Do I need to call out to Jesus today for help in overcoming my unbelief? Is there a healing or deliverance that is still 'pending' in my life? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

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29 OCT, TUESDAY

Kingdom Hierarchy

Context 1) Why did the disciples remain quiet in the face of Jesus' Ouestions question in Mark 9:33? What does this say about their conscience in discussing their ambitions and relative to ponder hierarchical placements? 2) Does Mark 9:35–37 indicate that the Kingdom of God has an inversed hierarchy, where the only difference is that the master serves and the servants lord it over the master? 3) Jesus the Son of God dying as a criminal on the cross (as he taught the disciples in today's passage) is the ultimate example of how the Kingdom of God is no respecter of our expected hierarchical systems. Jesus provides Head another profound example in Mark 9:36–37 – the little child is to be welcomed as the Son of God should be What can I understand? welcomed! How do I treat children and other 'less valuable' members of society? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

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30 OCT, WEDNESDAY

Those Who Belong to Jesus

Mark 9:38–50

Context 1) What was John's attitude in today's passage? What did Questions Jesus tell John to do? Could John have caused the unnamed exorcist to 2) to ponder stumble with his words? Who are the 'little ones' whom Jesus refers to in Mark 9:42? 3) Most Christian discourse around 'stumbling' focuses on the outwardly visible (dressing, consumption of alcohol, and the like). This can lead to victim-blaming, and excuses being made for those who should pay more attention to Jesus' instructions in Mark 9:43-47. How can I lovingly support my brothers and sisters without perpetuating shaming or victim-blaming? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do? fore GOD. fore PEOPLE. Make DISCIPLES.

31 OCT, THURSDAY

Laws of Hard Hearts

Context 1) The Pharisees' question is borne of their worldview which Ouestions centers the lawfulness (or otherwise) of every action. Does Jesus respond within that worldview? to ponder 2) The Pharisees quoted God's Law as given to Moses, but Jesus explains how the laws on divorce were an accommodation rather than prescriptive. Does this have broader implications for Old Testament Law as a whole now that we are in the time of the New Covenant? 3) Does Jesus' answer to the disciples in Mark 10:11–12 provide a new Law for those of us who follow Him? Head What can I understand? Heart How do I respond? Hands What must I do?

1 NOV, FRIDAY

Like a Little Child

Context Why did the disciples rebuke those bringing little 1) Ouestions children? What underlying attitude is revealed here? 2) Jesus' words in Mark 10:14 are reminiscent of His words to ponder in Mark 9:37 - somehow the small, the immature, the unimportant are of chief importance ('belongs to such as these') in the Kingdom. What should those of us who are mature and wise in a worldly sense do with this teaching? 3) Why did Jesus say that the kingdom of God must be received 'like a little child'?
